Qualifications of Bishops

3 The saying is sure: whoever aspires to the office of bishop desires a noble task. ²Now a bishop must be above reproach, married only once, temperate, self-controlled,

respectable, hospitable, an apt teacher, ³ not a drunkard, not violent but gentle, not quarrelsome, and not a lover of money. ⁴He must manage his own household well, keeping his children submissive and respectful in every way, ⁵ for if someone does not know how to manage his own household, how can he take care of God's church? ⁶He must not be a recent convert, or he may be puffed up with conceit and fall into the condemnation of the devil. ⁷Moreover, he must be well thought of by outsiders, so that he may not fall into disgrace and the snare of the devil.

Qualifications of Deacons

⁸ Deacons likewise must be serious, not double-tongued, not indulging in much wine, not greedy for money; ⁹ they must hold fast to the mystery of the faith with a clear conscience.

REFLECTION

Our reading from 1 Timothy today offers us a convincing outline of the necessary spiritual, behavioural and honourable requirements to be appointed for a high level of church leadership. We don't have authoritarian Bishops in the Uniting Church in Australia as we aren't a hierarchical church in the same sense as other denominations. However, we do have a President of the Assembly who speaks on behalf of the whole of the UCA, a Moderator for each state/territory and Presbytery Chairperson whose responsibility is for the Presbytery and Congregations have a Church Council. After an extensive process, Church leaders are elected by the body of each of the Councils they operate in. The Ordained Minister or Deacon serves in their discerned and affirmed capacity in any of the Councils of the Church.

As we find in 1 Timothy, 'If anyone aspires to the office of overseer, he desires a noble task.' This verse alone sets a tone of seriousness and importance regarding leadership within the church community. The role of the minister/deacon in the case of the UCA isn't one of authority, but one of service and servanthood, a calling to shepherd Christ's flock who have been entrusted into their care.

Paul isn't ambiguous in what we can expect from those whom we elect to lead us – he reflects the moral and ethical standards that we ought to expect from them. They must have integrity, honesty and be credible in word and deed. This isn't just for their own benefit as these qualities also serve to uphold the sanctity of the church and for God's mission to be upheld. Faithful, and trustworthy leaders demonstrate a way of life that is in an alignment with Christ's call of service, witness and worship as an encouragement for others to follow.

Paul isn't mealy mouthed in the necessities of leadership as he highlights the importance of having a clear mind, being self-controlled without trying to have total control over others – a modern term for this could be 'to stay in your own lane' don't try to do the work that others have committed themselves to do- assist when asked, but concentrate on your own task, and to be respectable and respectful of others and what they're doing. Each of these attributes sheds light on the nature of leadership in the church at each level of our interconciliatory councils. Leadership requires a sound and prayerfully measured response to challenges rather than unhelpful rushing to provide an answer to a problem. These are qualities which are crucial in navigating the complexities of faith and community life. When we try to solve a challenge on our own without the inclusion of prayer, a question we could ask is where do we find God in our challenge and importantly in our answer?

Paul doesn't stop with the community expectations upon the capacity whilst engaged in leadership in the church, Paul also comments on how their behaviours extend into the family home as well – how leaders behave at home amongst those whom they love and cherish is often an indication of how leaders behave in the public arena.

Paul does say though, to be careful in giving leadership roles to new believers mainly because he wants to highlight the importance of spiritual maturity. Leadership in the church isn't purely about knowledge; it involves wisdom gained through experience and a deep understanding of faith and its cost. Being grounded in our faith helps one to be self-aware, not falling into a position where pride in one's own achievements is greater than being humble at heart and the received grace from the cross being passed on to others.

For Deacons in the church the expectations are the same – we are also called to have integrity as we serve God's beloved children in Christ's church. All of which is rooted in living out our faith in an authentic way. The nature of service in the church focuses on showing that every role in the body of Christ is essential and worthy of esteem.

As we reflect on these expectations, we are urged to encourage leaders to embody the qualities Paul outlines for us. We are called to nurture an environment where faith can grow and discipleship flourishes. It's not only about filling roles; it's about nurturing authentic relationships and supporting each other in our faith journey.

It's always important for us not to neglect to pray for our leaders – whether we agree with them or not – we have leaders in place because that's where God has called them to be. We seek to embody these qualities in our own lives whether we are called into leadership roles or not. It's a reminder that all of us are ambassadors of Christ, and within that calling lies a responsibility to reflect Christ's character to those around us. Church leadership ought to always be about serving others, and pointing others towards Christ, reflecting Christ's love and grace in every action.
