Reading: Luke 24:44-53

³⁶ While they were still talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you."

³⁷ They were startled and frightened, thinking they saw a ghost. ³⁸ He said to them, "Why are you troubled, and why do doubts rise in your minds? ³⁹ Look at my hands and my feet. It is I myself! Touch me and see; a ghost does not have flesh and bones, as you see I have."

⁴⁰ When he had said this, he showed them his hands and feet. ⁴¹ And while they still did not believe it because of joy and amazement, he asked them, "Do you have anything here to eat?" ⁴² They gave him a piece of broiled fish, ⁴³ and he took it and ate it in their presence.

⁴⁴ Jesus said to them, "This is what I told you while I was still with you: Everything must be fulfilled that is written about me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms."

⁴⁵ Then he opened their minds so they could understand the Scriptures. ⁴⁶ He told them, "This is what is written: The Messiah will suffer and rise from the dead on the third day, ⁴⁷ and repentance for the forgiveness of sins will be preached in his name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. ⁴⁸ You are witnesses of these things. ⁴⁹ I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."

⁵⁰ When he had led them out to the vicinity of Bethany, he lifted up his hands and blessed them. ⁵¹ While he was blessing them, he left them and was taken up into heaven. ⁵² Then they worshiped him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy. ⁵³ And they stayed continually at the temple, praising God.

Reflection

As context, this reading takes place right after the Road to Emmaus story. The disciples who had walked to Emmaus have rushed back to Jerusalem and reported on their experience to the disciples and followers. Imagine the conversation! What joy? What confusion? What doubt?

And during this report, Jesus appears to the group. Jesus does not appear to a selected few, but to a larger group of disciples and followers. Luke recounts the community is 'startled and frightened', thinking they had seen a ghost. Despite the many messages and teachings Jesus had given his followers before his death, Jesus' resurrection was still a surprise. And Jesus reaches out in a very practical way to reassure the disciples, asking for something to eat before teaching them.

In life, Jesus and his disciples ate together regularly, and teaching was often shared over a meal. The gospels are full of narratives of meals shared, wedding feasts, feeding of large crowds, and of course, the final meal – the last supper. Luke returns to this theme, of Jesus eating with his followers, reestablishing the familiar.

The early Christians would replicate this practice, gathering for a meal and teaching. And in the meal and teaching, would be reminded that Jesus was with them.

The Gospel of Luke was written around 80-100AD, shortly after the destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple in 70AD. Lukes account is, in part, is intended to reassure Christian converts of the power and love of God. The crucifixion and resurrection are central to the Gospel of Luke; with the resurrection key to achieving God's redemption work in the world. While the Romans could crucify, only God can resurrect. Only God has power over death. And in the middle of the chaos of the period, God is present and brings comfort.

And Jesus givens his disciples an unexpected direction – to wait in Jerusalem. For the early disciples Jerusalem was the place of their greatest despair: the death of Jesus. But it is also the centre of their greatest hope: the resurrection and ascension of Jesus. The disciples waited in Jerusalem for the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, 'and they stayed continually at the temple, praising God' (verse 53).

Though this passage, Luke is weaving together a message of audacious hope and faith. Luke is reminding people that during despair, chaos and doubt that God is with them.

And God is with us, in the familiar and in the unexpected places. God is calling us always to have faith, to have hope, and to boldly praise God in all things.
